The guidelines established by the University of North Bengal govern the College's curriculum. Semester-based courses are offered from 2018-19 session. The broader vision and objectives of the college are kept in mind so that the curriculum can be put into practice effectively. The departments hold meetings at the start of each session to discuss and prepare for the next session's course delivery. The use of reference materials, internal assessments and teaching aids for teachers are discussed. In order to provide quality education in the teaching-learning processes, special classes are also taken. Several departments frequently conduct educational field trips, projects, and surveys with the students accompanied by departmental teachers. In addition to academics, the college offers co-curricular and extracurricular activities for holistic growth. To ensure that the curriculum is effectively delivered, teachers are encouraged to include ICT, blended learning, experimental learning and other methodologies in their course plans. Moreover seminar presentations, group discussions, class tests, continuous evaluation and internal assessment are frequently carried out to guarantee the learning outcomes of each subject.

Feedback Obtained
<p>Consistent and participative efforts to bring about improvements remain the central focus of the college management. Seeking and surveying feedback is one of the major components of this practice. The driving force behind the procedure of feedback is the will to transform constructive suggestions into concrete steps. During the academic year 2018-2019, the feedback committee of IQAC designed and collected feedbacks from students and parents to evaluate the college performance on curriculum and related issues, efficacy of teachers on various parameters, standard of laboratory and library, ICT facilities, along with other non-academic yet related services like clean drinking water, canteen, hostel, safety and hygiene in campus, interest generated in sports and cultural activities, cooperation from office and effectiveness of skill developments and placement cells. Although a subsequent survey of the students' (250 responses) and parents' feedback (150 responses) revealed mostly satisfactory responses, there were lukewarm responses in certain areas which the IQAC took cognizance of. The academic issues which needed improvement were referred to the academic sub-committee of Teachers' Council to be discussed and resolved in subsequent periodic meetings. The non-academic ones were brought to the notice of the concerned staff for necessary steps to be initiated for hauling up their performance.</p>

2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Mentoring is a supportive relationship that inspires young minds to bloom to their full potential. Students tend to feel awkward to seek professional help for their concerns either due to inhibitions or are simply confused as to whom to approach. In such situations it is important that students approach one with whom they are familiar - a teacher who can guide them on the right path and help them address their challenges in a more effective way. This is the fundamental principal of the mentoring system available to the students in Ananda Chandra College. The institute has an integrated mentoring system where the faculty acts as a link between the students and the institution. The HODs (Head of the Department) of various departments along with respective faculty collectively carry out the overall mentoring process to monitor and guide students all through the three years. Thus the objective of the Mentoring programme is to give students access to immediate assistance. The HODs meet all mentors/faculty of his/her department at least once a month for the reviewing of proper implementation of the system. The mentoring system has contributed to instilling a sense of belonging and security in the students. The encouragement and assistance of the mentors helps nurture the aspirations of the students and infuse them with the positivity and drive essential to overcome all obstacles. The mentoring sessions also help bring to the fore issues which may seem taboo/ personal to the mentees, thus building a relationship of confidence and respect between the mentor and mentee. The mentoring programme does not only benefit the mentee but by stepping into the role of a mentor, teachers are exposed to a host of problems encountered by the young generation today. It is also important for teachers to grow and adapt to the changing times in order to connect with and reach out to students. The mentoring system has been well structured. The mentor and mentees meet regularly.

The mentoring sessions are an open, unbiased platform for the students to voice their concerns and apprehensions about their personal and academic issues. In addition to conducting mentoring sessions at regular intervals the mentors maintain an open channel of communication whereby the mentee can approach the mentor at any point of time for assistance. Establishing a relationship outside the formal classroom setting allows teachers to provide additional attention to students and their problems. Based on the trepidations expressed by

the students, the mentors assist in advising the best course of action. Their wisdom and experience have lifted many students from various problems.

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The Continuous Internal Evaluation system followed by Ananda Chandra College is based on the guidelines provided by the University of North Bengal. The system of Continuous Evaluation has undergone changes based on the type of programme (Annual system or CBCS). For the Three Years' Annual System Undergraduate Programme the emphasis is on Selection Examinations conducted roughly 3 months prior to the students' final University Examinations. The students' performance in this examination along with their regularity of attendance (minimum 75 percent) determines whether the student can appear for the final examination. Apart from this, group projects and presentations which aim at fostering peer-learning and mentoring are also encouraged all through the year. For the CBCS system, Internal Examinations are conducted by the college before the University Semester Evaluation. Further regular class tests, power point presentations or assignments are also part of the continuous mode of assessment. Marks are also assigned for attendance. This helps improve student regularity and participation in class. Each department has worked out the details of how the CIE is to be conducted for the courses, ensuring that learning objectives of each paper are achieved through different assignments which are designed such that they not only test the knowledge-base of the students but also prepare them for time management during examinations. CIE also provides a mechanism to review and modify teaching methods if the students do not perform satisfactorily.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The academic calendar of the University of North Bengal is strictly followed by Ananda Chandra College. In the annual system, every new academic year begins in July and ends in June. The College calendar is prepared ensuring consonance with that of the University. For the CBCS system the academic year is divided into two semesters, each of duration of 15-18 weeks. The University sends schedules of undergraduate and postgraduate examinations ahead of time. The College consults the calendar provided by the University before finalizing the college calendar. The Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) process of the college is also scheduled in coordination with the University calendar of semester end examinations and practical examinations. The college calendar is prepared according to University examination dates, with important annual college events interspersed and holidays included. Teachers and students regularly consult the college calendar to plan their own schedule according to the deadlines set by the University. In order to ensure that opportunities of exposure for the students are not lost, a little flexibility is permitted in the college calendar through the conduct of innovative programmes, seminars and workshops which brings the joy of surprise to the students.

Development, maintenance, restructuring, renovation and optimum utilization of its physical infrastructure is one of the topmost priorities of the Institution. The authorities have already acquired State sanction for the construction of a separate building to house the Science Departments with all up-to-date laboratory provisions. The college has also undertaken major initiatives in renovation and modernization of the Girls and Boys Hostels. Regular cleaning up of the compound, rooms, corridors, toilets etc are done by

Grade -IV staffs. Skilled workers are hired , as and when required, for repairing furniture, fans, lights, electrical wiring etc. Laboratory- All laboratory purchases are done as per standard norm through tender system. Students are divided in batches for practicals to ensure proper utilization of resources under continuous monitoring of supporting faculty members. Laboratory staffs maintain record of accounts which are supervised by the senior-most faculty of the concerned department. Technicians are regularly consulted and hired for repairing , calibration and maintenance of sophisticated lab instruments. Library- Smooth and effective functioning of the library is taken care of by the Library Advisory Committee, comprising of the Principal, the Librarian and senior faculty members. It is ensured that the newly admitted students are issued library cards within a month of commencement of classes. The Librarian conducts Departmental Orientation Meets to guide students regarding accessing the facility of e-resources and other web-based information. Issues like preservation of rare books, effective environment for reading room, etc are regularly addressed in the Library Committee meetings and plans are drawn up and executed accordingly. Sports Complex- The college has a sprawling sports ground adjoining the college Gymnasium where all outdoor sports activities are held. The Gymnasium serves as an indoor stadium for badminton and table-tennis and other indoor sports. The senior teachers of the Physical Education department supervise the maintenance and regular upkeep of the sports ground. Computers- The college , in consultation with Computer Science Department and Bursar, hires skilled technicians, as and when required, for maintenance of the computers , smooth functioning of network facilities, looking into the college website, its up-gradation, procurement of hardware and software and other items related to computers. Classrooms- With the aim of equipping some class rooms with the required audio-visual teaching aids, one gallery room with desirable seating capacity has been made functional as smart classroom. Alongside, the main classrooms of majority of departments are infrastructurally equipped for delivering lectures via PowerPoint presentation. Water-ATM and Purifiers- Safe and cool(optional) water is made available in the college campus by installation of two smart water dispensers in the main corridors, and one water purifier installed in the college office.
