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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Ananda Chandra College began its journey in pre-independent India (1942) as an institute of learning in Jalpaiguri, located in the sub-Himalayan region of North Bengal. The college was named after Sri Ananda Chandra Routh by his son Sri Nalini Kanta Routh to whose vision and benevolence the institution owes its luminous presence. While Sri Nalini Kanta Routh is considered to be the 'heart' of the college, Sri Debendra Kumar Chanda and Sri Tarani Mohan Chakraborty are regarded respectively as the 'soul' and' brain' of the college. The trio was driven by the vision of an effective nation-building through education, which, in the words of Swami Vivekananda, is "the manifestation of perfection already in man". Thereafter, an institution that started its journey with a few departments teaching only Intermediate Arts and Science courses, slowly and steadily started teaching undergraduate curriculum, preparing students for B.A/B.Sc. Pass Course in the beginning and then finally for B.A/B.Sc. Honours course. Simultaneously, the institution continued adding more and more subjects in its teaching spectrum. Subjects like Computer Science in the '90s and Physical Education in the early years of this century were introduced in sync with the demands of time and demands of an overall holistic development of students. At present, as many as 22 subjects are taught in the undergraduate level. Crowning it all is the latest introduction of Post graduate course in Bengali and Undergraduate course in Journalism and Mass Communication. A new Science building has been constructed to accommodate the science departments.

Ananda Chandra College is affiliated to the University of North Bengal and recognized by UGC under section 2(f) and 12(b).

The institution has completed two cycles of NAAC evaluation, in 2004 and 2016, and has been accredited with B++ Grade in both the terms. At present the college IQAC, the principal, governing body, alumni, teachers and non teaching staff as well as students and all stakeholders are preparing to face NAAC for the 3rd cycle of accreditation.

Vision

When the idea of setting up an institution of higher education in a so-called remote region at the borders abounding in tea gardens, dense forests and a large habitat of ethnic population arose in the minds of three great sons of the soil, they were simply guided by the vision of imbibing the culture of education among the aspiring locals and ensuring for them quality education within their own locality.

Housed in a region that enjoys not only the bounties of bio-diversity but also of ethnic diversity, the institution, in sync with the vision of the trio has played a historical role by not only providing a cohesive narrative to local cultures within an institutional framework, but also connecting these institutional spaces with larger network of knowledge and information beyond the constraints of geographical location. This duality of commitment to local cultural traditions and broader academic currents is what makes this institution stand out among the rest of its kind in this region.

The vision of Ananda Chandra College has been to successfully perform its role as a catalyst in the growth and dissemination of knowledge in shaping the path of development of the youth of this region. With this vision, the

institution has been diligently executing its mission in the remote areas of North Bengal, serving as a beacon of hope for those living at the periphery, for whom formal education was, if not impossible, a remotely possible dream. With this vision as a guiding force, the teachers, students, and administrative staff alike engage their knowledge with issues like deprivation, poverty, inequality, displacement, oppression, empowerment and most importantly, sustainable development.

Mission

The governance of the institution never loses sight of the fact that acquisiton of knowledge bears sanctity only when it transcends socio-economic, ethnic, language and other barriers to create favourable conditions for the growth of democratic space, opportunities, and equity. In this institution ,the teachers, students and administrative staff alike engage their knowledge with issues like deprivation, poverty, inequality, displacement, oppression, empowerment and most importantly, sustainable development. By giving the students from economically weaker sections fee waiver and financial assistance to the poor and meritorious ones, the college fulfils its mission of ensuring education for all. The college works with the mission of providing a space free from gender bias and congenial for women to spread out their wings and soar high in terms of academic achievements. With the mission of fostering an overall holistic development along with academics, the college encourages students to participate in various extracurricular, cultural activities, sports, quiz, debate, elocution and other activities conducted in college. An educational institution functions even better when it promotes the welfare of it's people, over and above, the visions of an educational policy. To this effect, the college NCC unit works actively with the mission of achieving a healthy mind in a healthy body. The college NSS works relentlessly with social welfare mission that happens to be one of the most important attributes of ideal education. Overall quality enhancement of education on all parameters is overseen by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell of the institution.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

- 1. A sylvan surrounding and location that ensures a peaceful ambience for intellectual activity.
- 2. The college has a sufficient number of teachers.
- 3. Library resources meet the standards in terms of quantity and quality.
- 4. Many of the teachers have M.Phil / Ph.D and also have research experiences along with research publications.
- 5. There are hostels for both girls and boys
- 6. There is a gymnasium for indoor games and a sprawling ground for outdoor games.
- 7. There is an open air theatre and air conditioned seminar hall for cultural programmes and seminars.
- 8. A separate block has been constructed to accommodate the Science Departments.
- 9. There are ramps to cater to physically disabled persons.
- 10. The college brings out students' magazine annually without fail (barring the Covid year when there was a national shut down of colleges).
- 11. The Anti-ragging committee, Grievance cell and Internal Complaints Committee are active in preventing and addressing any untoward incident threatening the safety of students
- 12. The college has active Reading Club, Quizzing Club, Drama Club, Youth Parliament Committee,

- Electoral Literacy Club and Eco Club to encourage simultaneous extracurricular activities with academics.
- 13. Departments hold seminars, webinars, lectures in the academic interests of students and also for generating social and environmental awareness among students.
- 14. During the lockdown phase teachers have honed their skills in using technology to deliver online classes.
- 15. The college NCC and NSS teams are very active
- 16. The college has an ideal working environment marked by a spirit of co-operation among teaching and non-teaching members and students.

Institutional Weakness

- 1. An inadequate number of non teaching staff.
- 2. The present infrastructure does not sufficiently support innovative use of technology in delivering lectures.
- 3. Being an affiliated college, there is little scope for autonomy in curriculum planning and course designing.
- 4. Lack of government and private funds to boost research activities among teachers.
- 5. The college could not avail of the RUSA fund
- 6. Rooms allotted for some Humanities departments are not spacious enough to accommodate the huge number of students enrolled.
- 7. Cleanliness often falls short of the desired standards for want of sufficient number of sweepers
- 8. The Alumni is not active enough to provide financial support.
- 9. The laboratories have a dearth of skilled attendants.
- 10. The number of workable computers is insufficient for catering to the huge number of students
- 11. The possibility of academic- industry linkage should be extracted more.

Institutional Opportunity

- 1. The rich diversity in students' strength has allowed for enriched and vibrant teaching and learning experiences.
- 2. The college provides fee waivers to poor but meritorious students, thus ensuring that fruits of education are made available to the deserving, irrespective of their economic status.
- 3. With a good number of teachers with research experience, research-oriented study and innovative thinking in students is encouraged
- 4. A cooperative and cordial relation among teaching and non-teaching staff facilitates success of initiatives that require the fullest involvement of all sections of staff.
- 5. With the setting up of a new block exclusively for science departments, science education can be made more updated and effective.
- 6. The college plans to increase its collaborations with other institutions not only as part of the faculty exchange and student exchange programmes, but also to cater to the need of skill enhancement programmes among students as per guidelines of NEP 2020.
- 7. A diverse range of teachers of all age groups provides an opportunity to blend the experience of the older ones with the fresh and contemporary ideas of the younger ones in chalking out different add-on and certificate courses for additional enrichment of students.
- 8. The college, with a good number of dedicated teachers with rich research activities, can plan seminars

- and lectures for exploration of spaces beyond the assigned curriculum.
- 9. Teachers who have undergone faculty development programmes in the recent times and are acquainted with the intricacies of the NEP 2020 can lend their knowledge for an effective implementation of the same for the benefit of students as envisaged by the newly introduced education policy.

Institutional Challenge

- 1.Although the college has availed of internet connectivity, there are frequent disturbances in connectivity, hindering activities that require uninterrupted internet supply.
- 2. Teaching in blended mode as encouraged by NEP is a distant possibility not only because of the digital divide and inaccessibility, but also because of lack of technical knowhow of many students from the remote tea gardens who are mostly first generation learners.
- 3. The college cannot gear up to the infrastructural requirements as envisaged by NEP for insufficient development funds.
- 4. Many departments are struggling with faculty shortage for want of sanctioned posts.
- 5. The college is facing challenges for want of sufficient government- sanctioned administrative posts.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

- 1. The college follows the academic calendar set by the parent university while adjusting it to suit the institution's specific requirements.
- 2. Along with the preparation of a departmental academic calendar scheduling probable dates for continuous internal evaluation, teachers prepare and follow an individual teaching plan at the commencement of every semester. To facilitate continuous evaluation, faculty members employ a variety of methods like group discussions, project works, and practical exercises, apart from traditional written examination methods.
- 3. Some teachers are involved in designing and developing the curriculum as members of BOS in the University of North Bengal. Other teachers discharge their university duties as paper setters, moderators, examiners, head examiners, etc.
- 4. The institution collects annual feedback from all stakeholders -students, teachers, alumni and employer. The analysis of the feedback and the report on the actions taken are displayed in the college website.
- 5. The institution conducted an add-on course "Drama in Practice". The course curriculum of the stipulated 32 hours course was designed and developed by the teachers of the departments of Bengali and English as mandated by UGC guidelines.

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- 6. Cross cutting issues like Gender Values, Human values etc. are integrated in the university curriculum. Additionally, Environmental Studies which is a mandatory subject gives students ample opportunity to engage with the issues of environment and sustainability.
- 7. Some of the departments conduct field works for an in- depth and practical understanding of the subject taught.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

- 1. Student- centric methods such as preparing project reports, film and documentary screening, study visits and tours etc. are effectively used. Interactive methods like group discussion, brain storming sessions, subject quiz, seminar presentations are undertaken for enhancing learning experiences. Many departments publish wall magazines on topics of public importance to enhance the participatory learning skills.
- 2. The institution assesses the learning levels of students through continuous evaluation and gives extra efforts to identify weak areas and arrange remedial classes. Likewise, students of exceptional quality are encouraged to attend advanced classes on a particular topic.
- 3. Continuous Evaluation Process is fair and transparent. Students are informed of the dates quite in advance to enable them prepare for the evaluation. Each student is provided with feedback by highlighting his/her strength and weaknesses.
- 4. There is a Grievance Cell to address any grievance related to the internal examination. Students can report their concerns regarding the transparency of the marking system, if any. It is the responsibility of the Cell to communicate the grievances with an appeal for early redressalto the department concerned.
- 5. Students are informed of POs and COs at the beginning of every semester through a well knit mechanism. The programme and course outcomes are stated and displayed on website and communicated by the department teachers to their students at the commencement of each semester.
- 6. Student-teacher ratio is satisfactory. This is important for an effective teaching- learning and mentoring mechanism.
- 7. Many teachers use ICT enabled tools to facilitate better understanding of subjects taught. The Covid induced lockdown encouraged the use of ICT enabled tools as an effective teaching learning process. Since then, classes through power point presentations became the norm for most departments.
- 8. The results and details of an overall institutional performance through Student Satisfaction Survey(SSS) questionnaire are displayed in college website.

Research, Innovations and Extension

- 1. The institution encourages research activities among teachers. This is evident from the fact that as many as 33 teachers of the institution are Ph.D degree holders. One senior faculty member of the Department of Economics had been recipient of the prestigious Fulbright Fellowship. At present, one of the faculty members from the department of Chemistry, Dr. Golam Moula, is pursuing Post doctoral degree having been granted SNSF Swiss Postdoctoral Fellowship. Some other teachers who have submitted their thesis are waiting to be awarded Ph. D. At present many teachers are actively involved in research.
- 2. There are five faculty members who are actively engaged as research supervisors. Some of their scholars have completed their research under their supervision and have been awarded Ph.D.
- 3. A section of faculty members have published papers in UGC listed journals, peer-reviewed journals and edited books and have to their credit authored books solely or in collaboration.
- 4. NSS and NCC units of the college are active in conducting extension and outreach programmes. From

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providing relief during Covid phase to organising medical camps, blood donation camps, sanitization drive, tree plantation drive, "save water" campaign, to mention a few. NSS has worked relentlessly for the upliftment of the locality. These programmes are initiated to generate social awareness and contribute to the holistic development of students.

- 5. Besides NSS and NCC some departments like Mathematics, Botany and Education have undertaken outreach and extension activities in their own capacity.
- 6. For formalising faculty / student exchange and collaborative research, MoUs have been signed with other institutions. Many such activities have already been conducted.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

- 1. Amidst space constraints, some of the science departments have been shifted to the newly constructed science building. Efforts are on to shift the entire Science departments to the new building.
- 2. The college has an Open Theatre, a Seminar Hall, Gymnasium and a large playground facilitating students to engage in extra- curricular activities like cultural activities, debate, elocution, seminar, quiz, sports, etc.
- 3. Good and adequate facilities like ramps are provided for the physically challenged.
- 4. The institution has IT facilities including Wi Fi and computers with required peripherals. The Computer Science department has system software and application softwares, both licensed and open source softwares.
- 5. All laboratory purchases are done through tender system as per standard norm. Repairing ,calibration and maintenance of sophisticated lab instruments are regularly done by technicians. Computers and other instruments undergo annual maintenance by service providers.
- 6. Boys' and Girls' Hostels are maintained by respective hostel superintendents in consultation with Hostel Committee. Regular cleaning of water tanks, garbage disposal and maintenance of garden is done.
- 7. The College Library is automated. The overall ambience of the library is good. Appreciable efforts have been taken to provide better reading ambience.
- 8. The library has subscription of internet. The database of Central Library has been switched over fom SOUL 2.0 to KOHA 22.11.23.
- 9. Implementation of library policy is monitored by a Library Committee that meets periodically .

Student Support and Progression

- 1. There are a good number of beneficiaries of Government Scholarships and Institutional Scholarships.
- 2. The college has an active Career Guidance Cell which organises programmes for college students from time to time.
- 3. The college Grievance Redressal cell actively sorts out students' grievances. To enable students to voice their complaints openly and honestly, without any fear of retaliation, the grievance/ complaint box is placed in front of the principal's chamber. The cell aims to address grievances in a timely manner, promoting a harmonious and conducive learning environment, and upholding the rights and interests of students.
- 4. The Anti ragging Cell and ICC are active. To build a ragging free space and curb the menace of ragging the Committee follows the UGC Anti ragging Regulations 2009. Anti ragging posters have been

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- displayed at strategic places for awareness.
- 5. For prohibition of sexual harassment of women at workplace, the college has an Internal Complaints Committee constituted as per UGC guidelines. The college also has a Women's Cell for sensitizing students on gender issues.
- 6. Commemorative days of national and international importance are observed and celebrated. Cultural programmes are often organised at the departmental level and institutional level throughout the year.
- 7. The college has active clubs like Reading club, Film club, Quiz club, Drama club that actively function for boosting interest in extra.-curricular activities among students. Alongside, Eco club and Electoral Literacy Club are active as awareness generating bodies.

Governance, Leadership and Management

- 1. Vision and mission of the institution is followed all through the planning. It aims to uplift culturally sound students, including those from reserved categories and students with physical disabilities.
- 2. The college decentralises curricular, co curricular and extra curricular activities through various committees. The principal leads by distributing administrative responsibilities among key stakeholders.
- 3. The Sub- committees and Statutory committees are functional in meeting the academic and non- academic requirements of students.

The college has integrated e-governance into its operation to streamline process.

4. No direct funds were allocated for new building, but the North Bengal Development Department has contributed fund for construction of a science building. The Governing Body allocates annual laboratory and field survey grants, with amounts revised on the basis of utilization.

The college conducts financial audits through a systematic review of financial documents, internal controls, and tax records.

- 5. Duty leave is granted to teachers to undertake various academic activities.
- 6. Along with a self appraisal system for teachers, a similar system has also been introduced for Non teaching staff.
- 7. Various social welfare measures are undertaken by the college NSS. The college has a medical officer. Financial support is provided through Students' Aid fund and Puja advances for casual staff, while the College Cooperative Credit Society aids staff members.
- 8. The college IQAC as part of quality enhancement initiative, facilitates student mentoring, introduces multidisciplinary add-on courses, and fosters research collaborations. It conducts academic, administrative and environment audits, collects stakeholder feedbacks, and establishes various clubs.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

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- 1. The college has specific facilities provided for women in terms of CCTV cameras on the campus, a Girls' hostel under the supervision of a lady teacher as Superintendent. For non-hostelite girl students, there is a girls' common room.
- 2. There is an active Women's Cell and ICC for addressing problems and concerns of girls in the college.
- 3. The college resorts to a plastic-free, tobacco free, green campus concept. The campus is surrounded by a large number of trees and has a medicinal garden. Solid biodegradable waste generated in the hostels is used to make compost which is used in gardens and Girls' hostel.
- 4. Rainwater harvesting has been maintained properly.
- 5. Green /Energy audit for 2022-23 has been conducted
- 6. The college strives to cultivate principles like Responsibility, Equality, Nationality, Gender equity, Environmental consciousness through celebration of days of national and international importance.
- 7. The two best practices of the institution are:
- The institution and it's various clubs encourage an all-round development of students through various extracular activities
- College library has been autamated to ensure effective use of library resources including digital resources.

The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

As an affiliated institution, Ananda Chandra College strictly adheres to the curriculum set by the University of North Bengal. Some of the faculty members of the college actively participate in curriculum development of the University as members of the Board of Studies. The college takes several initiatives to ensure effective curriculum delivery by following a well-planned and documented process. The Departments use a three-step mechanism: planning, teaching, and evaluation.

- The institution diligently follows a Central Routine meticulously made by Routine Sub-Committee to ensure the efficient delivery of curriculum and timely completion of syllabi within each semester's allocated timeframe. Every department prepares its own routine on the basis of Central routine. At the onset of every semester, the students are provided with the departmental routine and syllabus, thereby keeping them informed and prepared.
- Annual Academic Calendar is prepared and displayed in the college website to ensure timely
 completion of syllabi and activities. Some of the departments prepare their own Academic
 calendar following the schedules of the Institutions' Academic Calendar.
- While maintaining steadfast adherence to the Calendar, the college remains adaptable to special circumstances, such as the Covid-19 pandemic, where necessary adjustments are made with the welfare of the college community in mind. Classes transitioned smoothly to online platforms during the said period.
- Induction meetings are conducted for the newly admitted students by briefing them the features of Credit-based System, its evaluation process, choices for optional courses and credit earning.
- The teachers prepare Lesson plans for ensuring effective delivery of the curriculum and timely completion of the syllabi.
- Departmental meetings are held periodically to distribute the syllabus among teachers, for deciding the departmental activities required for ensuring effective delivery of the curriculum and to monitor whether the progress of syllabus coverage is as per the teaching plan.
- The teachers make effective use of combined 'chalk and talk' classes and demonstrations through ICT based lectures.
- Study Materials/ Lecture notes are distributed in the classes and are also made available in the college website and freely downloadable for students.
- Invited lectures/special lectures by renowned academicians as well as by the faculty members from other institutions with MOU are arranged.
- Field studies and excursions are arranged which provide hands-on experiences aligned with the syllabi.
- Adequate number of practical classes are allocated and laboratory manuals are provided. The laboratories are upgraded on a regular basis.

- For evaluation, the departments conduct regular class tests and other methods like student presentations, debates, and group discussions, preparing assignments etc.
- Special classes are conducted for slow learners identified on the basis of the Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE).
- Both attendance and marks of the students are given weightage for Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE).

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1

Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability in transacting the Curriculum

Response:

Professional ethics: The CBCS Philosophy Hons Course Applied Ethics (CC14) designed by North Bengal university and executed by the institution integrates the issues of professional ethics like Medical ethics and Media ethics. The program course in Department of Journalism & Mass Communication taught in college to prepare students for journalism as profession, deals extensively with Media ethics. Students are assessed internally through case study in the ethical parameters of their future profession, that includes "Ethical framework and media practice, media technology and ethical parameters, representation and ethics, media and regulations". The course curriculum of Education trains students into an

ethical understanding of the professional role of an educator. Through extension activities and field works the students are fine tuned to the ethical values of inclusivity, management, planning and community development that constitutes the professional ethics of a teacher.

Gender values: Apart from the curriculum of English, Bengali, History, Sociology, Political Science and Economics that gives a special emphasis to gender issues, like Feminism, its history and nuances, sexual politics, social classes and gender relations, gender stereotyping and women empowerment, the institution has an active and functional Women's Cell to address gender issues and inculcate gender sensitivity among students. Women centric cultural programmes are performed on Women's Day which is celebrated without fail (barring the covid years). The college ICC keeps a strict vigil to prevent any kind of gender abuse. Debates and seminars on women- centric issues are also held to inculcate gender values among students.

Human values: The core course of Education includes value education in its curriculum. The curriculum is so devised as to give the students a basic understanding of our constitutional values and educate the students on the role of teachers in facilitating development of values among students. Dept of Education strengthens human values of social inclusivity among students by arranging field work and extension programmes , whereby students go to nearby schools to educate the poor and the underpriviledged children. The diverse extension and outreach programmes undertaken by NSS and

NCC throughout the year along with other departments effectively integrate the issue of human values with the curricular models.

Environment and sustainability: The curriculum of Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, and Microbiology assigns special space to environment ,ecology, biodiversity, green energy etc. . An entire course in curriculum of Geography is dedicated to Sustainable Development. Environment and sustainable development also happens to be taught in one of the chapters of Discipline Specific Course in Economics. nvironmental studies is a compulsory paper for all 1 st year students who are instructed about the various environmental issues and for thorough understanding, each student is required to prepare a project report. Apart from the curriculum, students of NSS, NCC, and Eco Club engage with environment issues, Green audit and Energy audit are regularly undertaken. A medicinal plant garden is maintained in the campus under the supervision of the Department of Botany.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

Response:

Ananda Chandra College follows and ensures the use of student centric methodology such as experiential, participative learning and problem solving methodologies in teaching-learning process. Learning is made more student-centric through a combination of old and new methods.

- The college has well equiped laboratories in various departments where students are encouraged in experiential learning through hands on training on laboratory experiments.
- In addition, the departments apply various experiential learning methods which comprise of visual aids, film screening, periodical industrial visits, educational excursions, visit to the college Medicinal Plant garden, visit to the rainwater harvesting plant of the college and quiz competitions etc.
- To encourage scientific learning and to develop problem solving skills, the students are often asked to submit written assignments, projects, posters on topics related to their curriculum.
- For encouraging students in participative and interactive learning, the departments organise interactive sessions through group discussions, debate and quiz competitions.
- The departments conduct student seminars with PowerPoint presentations which not only improve their knowledge on the topic but they also learn to prepare power points, present in front of others as well as face question answer sessions which automatically improve the concept on any topic.
- Peer teaching methodologies are used by some departments under the supervision of department teachers, where students present a topic from their syllabus to the entire class.
- The students of Mass Communication and Journalism publishes a quarterly newsletter.
- Science departments conduct Science exhibitions.
- Students of the Language departments arrange stage performances on their literary texts.
- In order to nurture creativity, writing skills and presentation potentials among students, they are encouraged to submit articles on their creative ideas as well as on current topics to the departmental wall magazines and annual magazine ANANDADHARA published from the college.

To facilitate effective teaching and learning process, the college uses various ICT enabled tools. The use of ICT tools has helped in making learning more interesting to the students.

- During COVID-19 mediated pandemic situation, online platforms like Google Meet, Zoom, WebEx, Google Classroom, whatsApp, emails etc. were used by the students and teachers for teaching-learning and evaluation process.
- The teachers use various softwares like MS Word, MS Excel, PowerPoint, Paints for preparing study materials and classroom teaching. Some faculty members have created digital repositories of lectures on YouTube.
- Most of the departments are provided with desktops/laptops with internet connectivity and printers where teachers can prepare the lessons to be taught. The college has classrooms with ICT facilities. In addition to this, there are 76 computers with internet facilities exclusively for the usage of the students. Besides the computer centre, the college has three well-equipped computer labs in Computer Science, Mathematics and Geography departments.
- The college library has access to e-journals and e-books through N-List. The library also has a browsing area for teachers and students.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

The evaluation of the students on the basis of tests/examinations is an integral part of the teaching—learning process. Ananda Chandra College is affiliated to the University of North Bengal and hence, follows its rules and guidelines regarding the assessment and evaluation process of the performance of the students. The same is communicated to the students in the very beginning of the academic calendar year. Institution has an Examination Centre Committee which coordinates all the internal examinations as part of the Continuous Evaluation (CE) under CBCS system through various departments. This committee also conducts the external semester end university examinations. Students are informed about the dates of the internal tests well in advance.

Internal assessment has an important role to play for CBCS method. According to the affiliating university, internal assessments are assigned with 10 marks for each paper along with 5 marks for regular attendance under the CBCS pattern. Previous to CBCS system, the Annual Test Examination was prevalent, conducted as per the academic calendar of the college. The frequency and mode of internal assessment varies from one department to the other as per their curriculum.

Internal examination process includes setting of question papers, evaluation of answer scripts within a stipulated period of time and submission of marks. During the pandemic situation, internal assessments were held mostly through online mode using Google Classroom, Google Form, Whatsapp and other online platforms. The subject teachers brief the students in the classroom about their attendance and performance in the internal tests. Post evaluation, students are shown the evaluated answer scripts and then they are preserved safely by the respective departments. Thereafter, the internal marks are uploaded to the university examination portal.

The mechanism for redressal of grievances with reference to the evaluation varies for both internal and

external examinations. For internal tests students are free to interact with the teachers to resolve their grievances if any, regarding the evaluation in the classroom itself. They may also register written complaints regarding assessment, in the Students Grievance Redressal Box or may complain online which is later taken care of by the College Central Grievance Committee in consultation with the concerned department. The college also has a RTI cell. Due to mentor mentee system, teacher student relation is very trustworthy; hence, seldom grievances are raised regarding the transparency of the evaluation done. For external university semester end examinations, re-assessment and scrutiny of answer scripts are done as per university norms. RTI provision of the University is also available. The students forward their applications online to the university examination portal and PPR & PPS are done by the university itself.

Several teachers of the institution as members of the North Bengal University Board of Studies have been dynamic and responsive to emerging areas of knowledge, the world of work and needs of students, while framing the curriculum and adequately stating the Programme Specific Outcomes and Course Outcomes.

At the time of introduction of CBCS curriculum, these BoS members of the institution had conducted orientation programmes with other faculty members and students highlighting the Programme Specific Outcomes and the diverse ways of attaining them.

During admission counselling, faculty members deal in details regarding the learning outcomes of specific programmes. These sessions are undertaken to ensure informed choices in DSE,G.E,SECs following long term academic and career plans.

At the commencement of every semester teachers inform the students in details in terms of knowledge skill to be gathered as outcomes of the courses scheduled for that semester.

The institution routine committee (Arts and Science) meticulously prepares an institutional routine allotting I hour for each credit point as directed in the university devised curriculum. This is done to ensure the maximum attainment of PSOs and COs.

Each department, in it's departmental meeting at the beginning of each semester, chalks out it's own departmental routine(on the basis of the Master Routine) allotting entire course or course wise portions to faculty members based on their choice and expertise. Thereafter each faculty member draws out an individual lesson plan keeping in mind the time required to ensure the specific outcomes of courses of that semester This is again done to tap the fullest potential of faculty members to ensure PSOs and COs.

Attainment POs and COs are directly measured through

• Continuous internal evaluation: Different departments, according to their rquirements, conduct class tests, continuous formative discussions and evaluation of assignments. These are done for theory based subjects, in the form of quizzes, and project reports to ensure desired outcomes.

For practical based subjects, through hands- on training in all laboratory courses, the importance of arriving at an outcome in consonance with the task set is emphasized. Lab work and tutorials provide immediate feedback to students.

Also, project and field work, viva voce and group or individual presentation, written assignments and diverse other innovative means adopted by the faculties for continuous internal evaluation ensure effective attainment of learning outcomes.

- The performance of students in internal evaluation are stored in the department mail and rigorously examined by teachers in departmental meetings. The individual performance in continuous evaluation is discussed and areas of improvement are demarcated. On the basis of average poor performance over all courses of a particular programme, remedial classes are undertaken. Likewise, the outstanding performers are singled out who are given exposure to assignments of an upgraded (university) standard. This exercise ensures optimum outcomes attained on the basis of individual capacity..
- Academic audit: Through annual internal and external academic audit, the Programme Outcomes

- are monitored regularly at the college level. The areas of weakness are sorted out and actions are initiated in accordance.
- Semester-end Student evaluation: The results of the semester-end examinations conducted by NBU are carefully analysed in departmental meetings. The faculty, while marking the poor performers, chart out the following course of actions to ensure maximum programme outcome among all registered students thereby giving utmost attention to remedial measures to attain the desired outcomes.
- Feedback; The College IQAC meticulously designs questionnaires for feedback from all stakeholders. These are effective in centrally monitoring the desired Programme and Course outcomes and passing the results of the feedback responses to departments to sort out the issues as per their strength and provisions.
- Student satisfaction survey: The college conducts a Student Satisfaction Survey which seeks to understand students' perspectives on course related matters. The survey available in the college website gives due importance to the attainment of course and programme outcomes in their questionnaire. Students are encouraged to participate and are also encouraged to add their own observation regarding the teaching learning process and give suggestions according to their specific requirements. It helps the institution to devise strategies for continuous improvement.

3.2 Innovation Ecosystem

Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations, Indian Knowledge System (IKS),including awareness about IPR, establishment of IPR cell, Incubation centre and other initiatives for the creation and transfer of knowledge/technology and the outcomes of the same are evident

Response:

The College has been working continuously to inculcate the spirit of innovation in the minds of students through academic, research and extension. A conducive environment for faculty members to pursue quality research is ensured. Faculty members are engaged in providing an atmosphere that induces a desire for learning among students.

Research and Development Cell motivates faculty members to enhance their research performance and participate in conferences, seminars and workshops. They publish research papers in Journals included in UGC CARE list, peer –reviewed Journals and books with ISBN. Faculty members also attend conferences, seminar, symposiums, workshop, short-term courses, webinars regularly. Many teachers are pursuing Ph.D and post-doctorate at different Universities while some others are acting as Research supervisors.

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Students are encouraged to engage in teamwork for transfer of knowledge among each other. Clubs such as Quiz club, Drama club, Reading club, Film club conduct various such programmes regularly under the guidance of their teachers. Students are encouraged to participate Inter-College Youth Parliament Debate. Lectures by eminent scholars, webinars, seminars, group discussions and departmental presentations by students are arranged which help in knowledge building.

The advanced learners are encouraged and guided to attend examinations like JAM, CUET etc. for admission in MA/M.SC in IIT, NIT, Central University etc. Educational tours are organized that help students to experience field research activities. Through field surveys they also collaborate with their teachers, gain new perspectives, enhance interactive learning and foster leadership skills and communication skills.

The college hosts a study centre of Netaji Subhas Open University in its campus. The college has organized sensitizing programme for students by inviting experts on gender sensitization, on health and Hygiene, anti tobacco campaign, environment protection etc. with the active involvement of various departments, NCC, NSS and IQAC.

The annually published college Magazine 'Ananda Dhara' has been elemental in encouraging the creative potential among students as writers, poets and artists, etc.

In keeping with the traditional Indian knowledge system, the departments teaching exclusively Indian languages like Sanskrit and Bengali encourage students to imbibe the essence of our traditional knowledge system. The English curriculum includes Sanskrit literature. Indian philosophy is taught in Philosophy curriculum.

Practical experimentation in laboratories and theory lessons in classrooms are given equal weightage in Science departments.

The college NSS conducts activities that instill the traditional values of 'bahujanahitaya, bahujanasukhaya' among students, while Physical Education Dept. and NCC encourages practice of Yoga and other physical activities.

The Dept. of Botany has been maintaining a medicinal plant garden in campus and conducting outreach programmes to spread awareness of this traditional knowledge.

Central Library houses more than 45000 books including old /rare books. It's functions are fully automated through open-source Library management software 'KOHA'. The Library has subscription of N-List.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1

The Institution has adequate infrastructure and other facilities for,

- teaching learning, viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc
- ICT enabled facilities such as smart class, LMS etc.

Facilities for Cultural and sports activities, yoga centre, games (indoor and outdoor), Gymnasium, auditorium etc (Describe the adequacy of facilities in maximum of 500 words.)

Response:

The policy of the institution is to create and enhance infrastructure to facilitate effective teaching and learning process. The college is committed to offer resourceful infrastructure for holistic growth of the students. It provides adequate facilities for cultural activities, indoor and outdoor sports as well as other student and faculty support amenities. The institution has sufficient number of classrooms (particularly with the opening of the newly constructed Science building), laboratories, a computer centre, a central library, a seminar hall with ICT facilities, a large playground & a gymnasium for outdoor and indoor facilities and a Open Theatre.

Classrooms: There are around 38 class rooms till 2022-23 Academic session apart from the departmental rooms, seminar rooms, libraries and Science laboratories and computer laboratories for practical classes. With the opening of newly constructed Science Building, the number of classrooms has substantially increased. In 2022-23, Deptt of Mathematics and Physiology have been shifted to the Science Building whereas the shifting of other science departments are in progress.

The classrooms of Main and Science Buildings can accommodate approximately about 40-90 students. The big classrooms are well ventilated, with lots of sunlight, ideal for a crowded classroom. Some class rooms have ICT and audio facilities. The college has one smart classroom.

Central Computer Centre: There is a well-designed central computer centre with 12 computers and facilities like LCD projector, overhead projector etc which is used by students as well by the faculty members.

Central Library: The college library utilizes a space of 6948 sq. ft. with a reading room for free access of students and teachers.

Departmental ICT facilities: All the Departments have been provided with desktops/laptops with internet connection, some of which are dedicated to students only. Besides, some of the departments are provided with their own printers, LCD projectors, scanner etc.

Laboratories: There are nine laboratories for subjects - Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Computer Science, Botany, Zoology, Physiology, Microbiology and Geography. The laboratories are upgraded with advanced laboratory equipments and have given enough space to carry out practical classes effectively.

Botany, Zoology and Geography departments have museums also.

Auditorium: The Seminar Hall is used as an auditorium at present. The seminar hall which is unique of its kind with a stage for cultural activities, has an accomodation for almost 320 people. In addition to the Seminar Hall, the college has an open theatre named as Mukta Mancha where cultural events are organised.

Indoor and Outdoor sports facilities and Gymnasium: The College has a big playground of its own where our students can practice outdoor sports.

The Boys' and Girls' Common Rooms are equipped with Indoor Games like Table Tennis and Carom. There is a well equipped Gymnasium in the college premise which the students use regularly. Yoga and fitness workshops are organized in the Gymnasium and in the playground. The length of the Gymnasium is 40 meter and the width is 20 meter. The total space of the Gymnasium is 800 square meters.

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1

Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

Response:

- The Central Library of A.C.College located in the first floor of the main building, offers a wide range of information resources in various formats. It currently houses a collection of over 45, 812 volumes of purchased books and 1235 donation books, including reference books. All books and other library materials are organized according to the 19th edition of the Dewey Decimal Classification Scheme. Additionally, the library has preserved a rare collection of old books published between 1780 and 1930.
- The library automation has been implemented using Koha Library Management Software (version 23.11.03) accessible at https://accollege-staff.kohacloud.in/cgi-bin/koha/mainpage.pl. Before Koha, the central library was automated using SOUL software (Since 2012). In 2023, we migrated from SOUL to Koha. Currently, more than 38,000 titles have been added to the software, while the remaining books are still being processed.
- A separate library webpage has been created (https://accollege-opac.kohacloud.in/cgi-bin/koha/opac-main.pl). This page offers various digital services and facilities, such as access to previous years' question papers, syllabi, library and N-LIST memberships, Ask librarian, and hyperlinks to numerous useful websites providing a vast array of open-access e-resources. Additionally, students can use the Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) to search for available books in the library.
- Since 2017, the Central Library has subscribed to N-LIST (INFLIBNET), providing teachers and students with access to e-journals, e-books, and other reading materials available through N-LIST journals and publishers (https://nlist.inflibnet.ac.in/collegeadmin/vdashboard.php). However, the library did not subscribe to N-LIST in 2019 and 2020 due to the pandemic and the absence of a librarian.
- Currently, the central library subscribes to 13 printed journals listed in UGC CARE, as recommended by the respective departments. Additionally, the library subscribes to 9 magazines and 4 newspapers to support students preparing for various competitive examinations. The journals and magazines are displayed within the reading room in a stack to catch the attention of the library users.
- Reading rooms are available for both teachers and students within the library premises which

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- provide a perfect ambience for self-study. The library has a browsing space for teachers and students with three computers and internet connectivity.
- One of the unique services offered by the library is QR code-based access. This allows students to access e-resources and check the availability of books in the library anytime and from anywhere.
- In addition, the library provides many other services such as Lending Service, Reading Room Service, Reference Service, Referral Service, Current Awareness Services (CAS), Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC), Career Guidance Services, Best Library User Award, Old Questions Paper, Drinking Water/washroom Facilities, Library facility for outside readers, Library Orientation Programme, New arrivals (books) displays, etc.
- The college has a Library Sub-committee which acts as an advisory body and helps in decision
 making regarding collection development and overall quality enhancement of the library services.
 The meetings of the Library Committee are held on a regular basis. The library has a number of
 dedicated staff who are always available at the circulation counter to provide better services to the
 library users.

6.1.1

Response:

The vision and mission of this college is to bring about the upliftment of the culturally sound students, from both reserved and unreserved categories. It has been diligently executing this vision and mission in the remote areas of North Bengal, since the pre-Independence period. including divyang students (student with physical disabilities). With the implementation of the new CBCS curriculum, the challenge to provide quality education was adequately met by the participative management of various decentralized committees. The students from economically weaker sections of society are given waviers on their college fees, either half of it is waived off or the full amount. This system is popularly known as Half Free and Full Free Studentship. In addition, a considerable number of students get financial assistance from the Student Aid Fund of the college. Ramps have been constructed, at the entrance of all college buildings, to facilitate ease of movement for Divyang students. To foster an overall holistic development along with academics, the college encourages students to participate in various extracurricular, cultural activities sports, quiz, debate, elocution and other activities conducted in college. An educational institution functions even better when it promotes the welfare of it's people, over and above, the visions of an educational policy. To this effect, the college NCC unit works actively with the mission of achieving a healthy mind in a healthy

body. The college NSS works relentlessly with social welfare missions that happens to be one of the most important attribute of ideal education. Overall quality enhancement of education on all parameters is overseen by Internal Quality Assurance Cell of the institution. In the academic year 2020-2021, as per government directives, education was completely conducted online. Ananda Chandra College lived upto its vision, by slashing the fees for the students of the college, in this time period. In anticipation of the adoption of the National Education Policy 2020, the college prepared a roadmap for implementing the same. 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6.2.1

Response:

There is a famous saying that, a good leader leads by example, not by force. In this very spirit, the leader of Ananda Chandra College, the Principal, methodically distributes the administration of the institution amongst important stakeholders like the teaching and non-teaching staff. One such sub-committee which was very active in the year 2021-22, was the Cultural Sub-Committee. It successfully organized events to commemorate the birthdays of eminent personalities like Swami Vivekananda, Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose, Rabindranath Tagore, etc.

In the academic year 2018-2019, we can observe that-

- i. Curriculum Development- In this academic session, the Annual and Semester curricula are being taught simultaneously. Multiple intra-departmental meetings convened to distribute the curriculum.
- ii. Teaching and Learning- The traditional classroom teaching is conducted, along with some special and invited lectures organized by various departments to enrich the students. Field trips and tours . are conducted by the Geography, Sociology, Zoology, Education and Botany departments, in various parts of West Bengal, as well as other parts of India. Museum visit is also organised for the students of Department of History.
- iii. Examination and Evaluation- Internal exams conducted by each department along the CBCS guidelines, prescribed by he University of North Bengal. These contribute to the Continuous Evaluation marks of each semester result.
- iv. Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure- The space of the reading room was increased in dimension, thereby accommodating a larger number of students.

Through these events, the Sub-committee ensured that the various stake-holders of the institution were able to overcome the covid inertia and bring back the dynamic cultural milieu in the college. In 2022-23, the strategic plan of the college reflected in the planning for a blended mode of teaching. This was tried out in the Bengali and English departments. Curriculum based planning was undertaken. In addition to these, add-on courses in Drama and Translation were approved by the Governing Body. These were value-added courses, meant to skill the students in professional settings.

Dr. Madhurima Ray, Sadar Hospital, Jalpaiguri was present in the programme at Seminar Hall of the college. Dr. Ray visited 40 patients consisting of students and stafff of the college.

In 2021-22, Responding to the call from the State NSS cell, the volunteers of NSS unit-II of Ananda Chandra College started a Covid awareness campaign. Online and offline both platforms were used by the volunteers. They helped common people to get registration of Corona vaccine. It also plants trees all over the campus, to improve the environment of the campus. The college also has a medical officer, who is consulted from time to time, regarding the well-being of the institution. A blood donation camp was organised jointly by the National Social Service and National Cadet Corps units of the college.

Students' Aid Fund is given from the college funds to meritorious students from the EWS category.

Response:

Ananda Chandra College stands as a beacon of progress in fostering gender equity within its academic realm. Through a multifaceted approach encompassing institutional policies, facilities, and cultural initiatives, the college is striving to create an environment where every student, regardless of gender, feels empowered and valued.

- 1. Female students are provided opportunities to participate in the National Cadet Corps (NCC). By encouraging girls to join the NCC, the college not only promotes physical fitness and discipline but also breaks traditional gender stereotypes by fostering leadership skills and a sense of camaraderie among female cadets.
- 2. A separate girls' common room underscores the college's dedication to providing a safe and inclusive space for female students. Equipped with comfortable furniture and manned by a dedicated woman attendant, the common room serves as a sanctuary where female students can study, relax, and engage in meaningful conversations without fear of intrusion or harassment.
- 3. With CCTV cameras strategically placed across the campus and ID card wearing mandated for students, the college prioritizes the security of its students, irrespective of gender. Moreover, the presence of security staff further reinforces the college's commitment to create a conducive learning environment free from any form of harassment or intimidation.
- 4.A proper boundary wall with fencing provides a secure perimeter, while separate three-storey hostels for girls and boys ensure privacy and comfort. The Girls' Hostel is overseen by a Residential Superintendent who is a teacher highlights the personalized care and attention given to female students, ensuring their holistic development and well-being.
- 5. To ensure a ragging free campus, the college mandates all students to sign an anti-ragging declaration at the time of admission and establishing an Anti-Ragging Cell to address complaints promptly. Additionally, the presence of a Women's Cell and an Internal Complaints Committee (ICC) provides female students avenues to seek guidance, support, and redressal for any grievances or concerns they may have.
- 6.To promote gender equity and sensitize students extra-curricular activities, invited talks and cultural programmes are regularly arranged.
- A webinar was held on 17.09.2020 by Department of English on 'Unmasking Gender in the times of Covid-19' in collaboration with Malda College, West Bengal.
- Students represented Jalpaiguri in an event on 'Domestic Violence on Women' conducted by West Bengal Commission for Women at Kolkata on 30.05.2022.
- International Women's Day celebration proves the institution's unwavering support for gender

- equality. In 2021-2022, a debate on the topic "Society can ensure safety to the women" took place by the students on this ocassion.
- An invited talk by Smt Baby Upadhayay, Chairperson, Child Welfare Committee, Jalpaiguri was arranged for students' sensitization on 'Vishaka Guidelines', 'POSH Act' and 'ICC'.
- Students staged three short Drama adaptations "Chakravuha", "Iti Arpita" and "Ajker Chandalika" on the occasion of the birth Anniversary of Rabindranath Tagore (12th May, 2023), which focusses on and thereby raises awareness on gender-centric issues.

Response:

The college seeks to provide an inclusive environment for everyone with tolerance and harmony towards cultural, regional, linguistic, communal, socioeconomic and other diversities. Towards this effort-

- 1. Commemorative days like International Mother Language Day, Women's Day National Youth Day, National Science Day, Netaji Subhas Bose's birth anniversary and festivals like Saraswati puja and Christmas are celebrated. These are done with the aim of promoting the ideas of unity and harmony amidst diversity in our society and in our country.
- 2. The college has teaching and non-teaching staff from different parts of the state, belonging to different communities. They work together unitedly reflecting unity in diversity.
- 3. During Covid-19 lockdown, the teachers donated a day's salary to Chief Minister's Relief Fund to support those in need.
- 4. Students actively engage with local community during extension activities and outreach

- programmes which address the issues related to poverty, inequality and social justice. Through NSS and NCC, students receive practical training of working in and for the community. The value of working towards the common good of society is inculcated through various activities like Tree Plantation, Blood Donation camp etc. During the Pandemic, students from NSS participated in Covid Awareness Campaign, Corona Relief Distribution Programme, etc.
- 5.Dr. Sudip Chakraborty, a faculty of the Department of Economics started a voluntary school "Teesta Parer Vidyamandir" for underpriviledged children during lock down period. Since 2022, students of Department of Education have been voluntarily taking classes of the needy children of this school quite often. The students from the Department of Mathematics visited Korok Children Home for Boys in Race Course Para, a Govt led Juvenile correctional home for children (boys under 18 years of age). Through these outreach programmes the students gained an idea of the socioeconomic state of the areas surrounding the institution.
- 6. The college offers Free/Half Free Studentship and financial aid to students from economically weaker section of the societies with an aim to provide equal opportunity to all its students.
- 7. The college observes Independence Day, Republic Day, World Environment Day, Yoga Day, and National Youth Day to inculcate a sense of responsibility towards the country. On Independence Day and Republic Day, the teachers address the students about the significance of these days, highlighting the importance of Indian Constitution and the values, rights and duties as a citizen of the country.
- 8. The College organised the District Level Inter College Youth Parliament to make students aware of the functioning of the Parliament, and to help them consider relevant public issues and form their opinion on them. Sensitization of students to the constitutional obligations is also done through activities of the Electoral Club. All students take a compulsory course on Environment Studies which gives them insight into Environment Acts, Wildlife Protection Act, Forest Act, Global environmental concerns etc.

Practice 1:

Title: Holistic Development of Students through Extra-curricular Activities

Objectives:

- 1.To offer opportunities for students to learn the values of teamwork, individual/ group responsibility and fair competition,
- 2. To expose students to different cultures and perspectives, fostering appreciation for diversity and global awareness.
- 3. To develop a wide range of skills among students, not covered in curriculum.

The Context:

Extracurricular activities were deemed necessary to provide opportunities for students to develop skills, talents, and interests beyond the classroom. Extracurriculars offer students a chance to interact with peers promoting teamwork, cooperation, and socialization. These skills are essential not only for academic success but also for success in professional and personal life. Many extracurricular activities such as sports contribute to students' overall well-being and mental health.

The Practice:

Towards these goals, the college has a range of clubs, including the Drama Club, Film Club, Book Reading Club, and Eco Club, which foster communication, creativity, critical thinking, and environmental awareness among students.

Drama club provides a platform for students to express themselves creatively. Through acting, directing, writing, and various backstage roles, the students explore and develop their artistic talents.

Film club holds regular screenings of classics of world cinema. These screenings are followed by discussions where members analyze and critique the films, sharing their interpretations and insights.

The Quiz club seeks to engage both alumni and experienced quizzers into its activities. These ex-students take on the role of Quizmasters, leading monthly quizzes for current students.

The Reading club named 'Bibliophile' has been organizing discussion sessions where students and teachers engage with each other in reading, discussing and thinking together and "Meet the Author" sessions. A literary society 'Pen Poems' also exists in the college guiding and encouraging students to write poems and perform.

The Eco club, through various initiatives, empowers students to actively participate and voice their concerns regarding the environment.

Events such as college fair and inter-departmental reels competitions provide a dynamic platform for

students from diverse academic backgrounds to showcase their creative talents and innovative ideas.

Evidence of Success:

The Quiz Club has provided valuable mentoring and guidance to the students. They, as quiz masters and participants, are able to hone their skills in presenting to a larger audience.

The Film Club screens classic films, fostering cinematic appreciation and discussion among students.

The Drama Club, established in 2022 has staged four plays by May 2023. The first performance was held on International Working Women's Day Celebration, held on 3rd March, 2023. Students learn to overcome stage fright, speak in public, and perform in front of an audience, which can be invaluable skills in both personal and professional life.

Bibliophile's "Meet the Author" sessions offer students valuable opportunities to engage directly with authors, fostering insightful discussions and enriching the College's literary community. The student members of "Pen poems" society have presented their performance in some events.

The Eco Club is dedicated to promoting environmental awareness and conservation efforts among students.

Apart from the club activities, a fair, "Ananda Mela" was held in 2023 which served as a platform to foster innovation, creativity, and the spirit of entrepreneurship among students. The college organized and actively participated in district-level Youth Parliament, providing students with valuable insights into the functioning of democracy and parliamentary processes.

Many of our talented athletes have proudly represented our institution, clinching medals and prizes even in prestigious state-level, national, and even international tournaments.

Problems encountered and Resources required:

Balancing extracurricular activities with academic coursework can be challenging for students. It requires careful planning, effective time management, and a keen awareness of one's personal limits.

Limited funding and inadequate facilities further compound this challenge, often restricting the variety and quality of extracurricular activities available to students.

Practice 2:

Title: Knowledge Awaits, A smart Library Beckons

Objectives:

- Library automation and ensuring effective use of library's resources including digital resources
- To promote effective and interactive access and use of information resources for all users.

• To offer safe, comfortable, well-lighted, clean space, with adequate and appropriate seating arrangements

The Context:

The Central Library of A.C.College offers a wide range of information resources in various formats housing a collection of over 45,812 volumes of books (Except Donation books), including reference books and a rare collection of old books published between 1780 and 1930. The Library Sub-committee helps in decision making regarding collection development and overall quality enhancement of the library services.

The Practice:

- The library has been automated since 2012, first with SOUL software and then with Koha Library Management Software. Document searching facility through Web OPAC is available.
- Since 2017, it has subscribed to N-LIST alongwith printed journals, magazines and newspapers to support students preparing for various competitive examinations.
- A separate library webpage which offers various digital services and facilities, such as access to previous years' question papers, syllabi, library and N-LIST memberships, Ask librarian, and hyperlinks to numerous useful websites.
- One of the unique services offered by the library is QR code-based access
- Browsing space with three computers and internet connectivity are available for both teachers and students.

Evidence of success:

- Students can use the Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) to search for available books in the library.
- Students can access e-resources and check the availability of books in the library anytime and from anywhere.
- The students, teachers and ex-students are immensely benefitted by getting access to the digital services and facilities available in library web page and the hyperlinks to numerous useful websites.
- The reading room and the browsing space provide teachers and students a perfect ambience for self-study.
- The journals and magazines are displayed within the reading room in a stack to catch the attention of the library users.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

Shortage of staff with technical knowledge

Lack of staff in substantive posts.

Infrastructural resources required.

Although the library had subscription of N-List since 2017, it could not subscribe in 2019 and 2020 due

to the pandemic and absence of a librarian.

Future Plan: To subscribe Turnitin's comprehensive plagiarism detection services for research activities of the teachers.

7.3.1

Response:

Excellence across Various Domains

Ananda Chandra College, a centre of learning and culture in northern part of West Bengal, has been showing distinctiveness in various fields.

Since inception of the college, faculty members have been involved in diligent research activities along with efficient teaching. In fact, in the first decade of the college Sri R. M. Lahiri, faculty member in the Department of History, was a Ph.D. degree holder, a very rare achievement in those days. The tradition has been continuing till date as a majority of the faculty members serving in substantive posts now are doctoral degree holders. Thus, the faculty members remain associated with research and teaching activities simultaneously from the early days till today. Even today, some faculty members are officially guiding scholars in their research pursuits. Some scholars have already attained Ph.D degree under their supervision.

Our institution has a formidable team of 115 faculty members, dedicated to nurturing the minds of our students and fostering a culture of learning and growth. Dr Sudip Chakraborty, faculty, Department of Economics has been a Fulbright Visiting Professor and has taught at some of the leading universities in the USA. He has also delivered lectures at numerous colleges and universities globally.

We are one of the only institutions in the region offering Mass Communication as a subject. Moreover, our curriculum encompasses an array of specialized courses such as Microbiology, Physical Education, and Physiology, setting us apart from neighboring colleges. With 20 academic departments under our wing—comprising 9 Science subjects and 11 subjects in the humanities and social sciences—we offer a diverse spectrum of academic courses. With a sizable student population of 5000, our college community is diverse, vibrant, and bustling with activity. This large student body brings together individuals from

various backgrounds, culture, and walks of life.

The institution has been a hub of vibrant cultural activities, driven by the collective efforts of students, teachers, and non-teaching staff alike. For example, the college souvenir informs us that in 1944 a drama entitled 'Shesh Parjonto ',written by Narayan Gangopadhya, eminent writer as well as the then faculty member of the Department of Bengali, was staged by the students. In the following decades a number of dramas and theatres were staged, thanks to the endeavours of the teachers,non-teaching staff and students. The first English performances of William Shakespeare's plays in North Bengal, had happened in the auspices of this college in the 1970s. Carrying on that rich legacy, the Drama Club was formally convened in 2022 by Samik Dasgupta, Department of English. The Drama club has staged four plays by May 2023. These productions showcase the creative talents of students and contribute to the vibrant cultural atmosphere of the college. Sukanya Mustak, a student of this college, secured first place in the 34th State Bhawaiya Music Competition" held in Coochbehar in 2023.

Annually, the college publishes its esteemed magazine, capturing the essence of our academic achievements, cultural endeavors, and the collective spirit of our college community.

In the arena of sports, our college has a rich history of excellence.Back in 1940s Sri Runu Guha Thakurta, a student of the college, represented India in soccer in the 1951 Asiad as well as 1952 Helsinki Olympic Games. His footsteps have been followed by two students of the college namely Smt Himasri Roy and Smt Bhairabi Roy who participated in the international sports events for India.Smt.Himasri Roy represented our country as a sprinter in the 2016 ATF and SAF Games while Smt Bhairabi Roy was a national representative in the 2014 Losophony Games. Recently,in 2022 Priya Ghosh, a student of this college won gold and silver medals respectively in Yoga World Cup and International Yoga Championship held in Nepal. Another student, Shyama Mandal, won Gold medals in 200 and 400 meters, at National level East Zone Athletics Meet held in Patna in 2020-21 and in 2022-23.

Numerous former students have excelled in their respective fields. Notable alumni include Subir Sarkar, a distinguished scientist at the Saha Institute of Nuclear Physics; Debesh Roy, an acclaimed author honored with the Sahitya Akademi Award, Dr. Ananda Gopal Ghosh the historian who was awarded "Banga Ratna Samman" by the government of West Bengal, the literary critic, Dr. Asru Kumar Sikdar, recipient of diverse awards and accolades; Maloy De, an IAS officer who served as the former Chief Secretary of West Bengal; Mahendra Nath Roy, former Vice-Chancellor of Alipurduar University; Dipak Roy, Vice-Chancellor of Raiganj University, and many others.

In the realm of politics, the college's alumni have achieved notable success. Amar Roy Prodhan, an esteemed graduate, holds the remarkable distinction of being elected as a Member of Parliament eight consecutive times from 1977 to 1999. Additionally, Shri Mahendra Chandra Roy, Shri Manik Sanyal, and Shri Paresh Chandra Barman have also served as elected representatives in the Parliament. Furthermore, Shri Hitendranath Barman and Shri Nirmal Basu were elected to the legislative assembly and became esteemed members of the state cabinet. Ananta Deb Adhikary, Baccha Mohan Roy, Gobinda Roy, and Paresh Chandra Adhikary have also been elected as members of the Vidhan Sabha. Currently, Dr. Nirmal Chandra Roy, serving as the MLA of Dhupguri, is also an alumnus of this college.

Thus this college has had a profound impact not only on the academic, literary, cultural but also on the political landscape evident through the remarkable achievements of its alumni which continues even to this day.
